#### Emerson Early Literacy Challenge: Background & Overview

#### • What is the Emerson Early Literacy Challenge?

- In partnership with Emerson, The Opportunity Trust is launching the Emerson Early Literacy Challenge (ELC), a transformative initiative designed to accelerate literacy outcomes and establish proof points for the successful implementation of literacy plans.
- The Emerson ELC brings together Local Education Agencies (LEAs)(i.e., traditional and charter public school districts) to engage in a two-year immersive learning experience that focuses on planning for and implementing proven strategies that improve students' ability to read on grade level by third grade.

#### • Why is early literacy important for children?

- Literacy is the cornerstone of educational success and lifelong
  achievement, while illiteracy contributes to major societal challenges
  such as higher crime, incarceration rates, and increased poverty. In St.
  Louis, as in many parts of the U.S., several student groups—particularly
  Black students, students with dyslexia, those with IEPs, and English
  Language Learners—are performing below their potential in reading.
- In the early years, between birth and third grade, children learn to read.
   Once they enter fourth grade, children are expected to use reading to learn. If they struggle with reading by the end of third grade, they risk falling behind in subjects like science, social studies, and math, which increasingly rely on understanding word problems.
- Individuals with below-average levels of education are overrepresented among people in prison compared to the general population.
   According to the <u>National Adult Literacy Survey</u>, 70% of all incarcerated adults cannot read at a fourth-grade level, "meaning they lack the reading skills to navigate many everyday tasks or hold down anything but lower (paying) jobs."



- In response to these disparities, the Right to Read movement, spurred by the NAACP, is championing literacy equity nationwide. In 2022, Missouri passed Senate Bill 681 mandating evidence-based reading instruction and has prompted the Missouri Read, Lead, Exceed initiative, a \$60 million investment in literacy, including teacher training on the Science of Reading. Locally, the St. Louis City and St. Louis County NAACP chapters launched a reading campaign, further emphasizing the community's commitment to improving reading proficiency.
- Unfortunately, in St. Louis and across the U.S., many students,
  particularly Black students, English Language Learners, and those with
  IEPs, are not achieving literacy proficiency by third grade. The
  Emerson ELC seeks to address this by providing Local Education
  Agencies (LEAs) (i.e. traditional and charter public school districts)
  with the resources, training, and support needed to close these gaps.

#### **Goals and Objectives**

#### Primary Goal:

 The primary goal of the Emerson ELC is to close the third-grade reading proficiency gap in St. Louis, ensuring that all students, regardless of background, have the opportunity to succeed academically.

#### • Specific Objectives:

- Equip LEAs with the latest research and best practices in literacy instruction.
- Bridge the gap between academic research on the Science of Reading and practical implementation in classrooms.
- Create proof points in St. Louis that demonstrate what's possible when schools and communities commit to literacy equity.

#### **Program Details**

#### Who can apply?

The Emerson ELC is open to 3-4 Local Education Agencies (LEAs) from St.
Louis city and county. These LEAs will be selected based on their
commitment to literacy equity, their readiness for change, and their
ability to implement data-driven practices. See the application at

#### What does participation entail?

 Selected district teams will participate in a two-year immersive program that will bridge the gap between literacy research and practical implementation. Teams will consist of educators, school leaders, parents, and community partners who will work with experts in the field of literacy to develop and pilot tailored literacy plans for the 2024-2025 school year.

#### • What support will LEAs receive?

 Selected LEAs will receive a \$20,000 planning grant and, upon successful piloting of their literacy plans, up to \$250,000 in implementation funding. Additionally, they will receive ongoing consulting support from top literacy experts.

#### • Who is involved in the initiative?

- Emerson is the lead funder for the initiative in partnership with The
  Opportunity Trust which leads the program management. <u>Instruction</u>
  <u>Partners</u>, a national nonprofit education consulting firm, is the lead
  consultant for the initiative programming.

#### **Application Process**

#### How can LEAs apply?

 LEAs can apply through a detailed application process that opens on September 11, 2024, and closes on September 26, 2024. Applications will be evaluated and selected by the Emerson ELC Steering Committee.

#### • What should LEAs expect during the application process?

The application process is designed to be thorough but accessible.
 LEAs will be asked to provide information on their current literacy practices, their vision for improvement, and their readiness to implement significant changes.

#### Stakeholder Involvement

#### • Role of Community Stakeholders:

Community organizations, parents, and local leaders play a critical role
in supporting the LEA teams. Their involvement ensures that the literacy
plans are rooted in the needs and values of the community and that the
plans have the broad-based support needed for long-term success.

#### • Public Engagement:

 Regular updates, success stories, and interviews with key stakeholders will be made available to highlight the impact and progress of the initiative.

#### **Looking Ahead**

#### • Long-Term Vision:

The Emerson ELC is the beginning of a sustained effort to ensure literacy
equity in St. Louis. The lessons learned and successes achieved through
this initiative will inform future efforts and inspire other regions to adopt
similar approaches.

#### • Invitation to Participate:

 We invite all eligible LEAs to apply and encourage community members and organizations to support this important work. Together, we can ensure that every child in St. Louis can read proficiently by third grade.

#### The Opportunity Trust and Emerson Launch \$1 Million Early Literacy Challenge

A Groundbreaking Initiative to Close Literacy Gaps and Improve Educational
Outcomes for Students in St. Louis

ST. LOUIS, MO – [September 23, 2024] – The Opportunity Trust, in partnership with St. Louis-headquartered Emerson, the global automation technology and software company, has launched the **Emerson Early Literacy Challenge**, a strategic initiative aimed at helping close the literacy gap and increasing the number of students in the St. Louis area who are able to read proficiently by the third grade. This program, **made possible by a \$1 million charitable donation by Emerson**, is a direct response to the urgent call to action by the St. Louis NAACP, which challenged the community to get involved in helping to address the literacy crisis in St. Louis City and County.

Literacy is a gateway to opportunity and economic success. Disparities in reading proficiency, especially between Black and white students, remain a critical societal issue, with research showing illiteracy contributes to increased rates of crime and poverty in communities across the country. Nationwide, the NAACP launched The Right to Read campaign, which has been instrumental in raising awareness about the literacy crisis and advocating for evidence-based reading instruction. In Missouri, this movement focused on aligning reading instruction to the "Science of Reading," which led to the passage of Senate Bill 681, mandating the use of proven reading practices in Missouri schools.

"At Emerson, we recognize the foundation of a community's future workforce and the stability of our community begins with early childhood education," said **Akberet Boykin Farr, Vice President of HR, Corporate Functions at Emerson.** "The \$1 million investment we are making in the Early Literacy Challenge initiative in the St. Louis region is part of our commitment to help organizations working to ensure every child has the skills they need to succeed."

The Emerson Early Literacy Challenge seeks to accelerate literacy outcomes by engaging three to four charter and traditional public school districts in St. Louis City and County to participate in an immersive learning experience, connecting them with the latest literacy research and best practices to implement proven Science of Reading approaches in the classroom.

Selected schools will participate in a two-year immersive program that will help their literacy/reading improvement teams bridge the gap between literacy research and practical implementation for grades K-3. Teams will consist of educators, school leaders, parents and community partners who will work with experts in the field of literacy to develop and pilot tailored literacy plans for the 2024-2025 school year. Each district team will receive a \$20,000 planning grant for participation and will be eligible for up to \$250,000 in additional funding to fully implement their literacy plans in the 2025-2026 school year.

"The Opportunity Trust is thrilled to partner with Emerson on this landmark initiative. The Emerson Early Literacy Challenge provides a critical opportunity to prove that with the right tools and collaboration, we can close the literacy gap and ensure all St. Louis students succeed," said **Eric Scroggins, CEO of The Opportunity Trust.**

Julius inspires kids to become readers and his signature initiative, The Believe Projects® has gained local and national attention. Julius says, "Representation in literature matters because children need to see themselves as essential elements of a story.

The Believe Projects gives children an opportunity to have access to books that reflect their everyday life, and they get to meet the people who author books for them. These are the transformational experiences that ignite the much-needed behaviors, interest and excitement that lead children to becoming successful readers." The Believe Projects literacy labs have grown to become three preschools, thirteen elementary schools, and one middle school serving 6,000 students throughout metropolitan St. Louis.

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I seek to empower others. Education has been my tool for doing so. Whether through online tools, teaching, or training educators, I have a history of delivering on outcomes that make businesses more successful, and the world a better place.

After eight years in the classroom teaching every single grade from kindergarten to twelfth, two of those years as a grade team lead, three of those years as a department chair, and three of those as an ICT teacher; two years as a dean, a year as a Director of Curriculum and Instruction, two years as a principal, and three years as a charter school CEO, I know the full spectrum of K-12 educational achievement and what is needed for pedagogical excellence. I have observed and talked to school leaders in over a hundred schools including schools in South Africa, Jamaica, Ghana, Greece, England, France, Australia and New Zealand. I consulted in the United Arab Emirates, Sweden, New York City and Philadelphia. I have also helped to develop curricula at numerous colleges and universities. I have worked for some of the most successful public and charter schools in New York City and consulted with some of the most elite universities around the country.

The schools in St. Louis do not serve children well, sometimes you have to just ask "how are the children"? . Children and their needs are not centered as decisions are made. The focus becomes about politics and adult feelings, teachers are expressing their feelings of extreme tiredness and how they feel

unsupported and parents are often ignored, judged and shut out. In St. Louis, 74% of kids are reading below grade level in the largest district that services predominantly Black and Brown children. Less than 50% of kids in Missouri can read on grade level. Over the last 20+ years, there has been a mass exodus from our city, our schools, with the number of enrolled students having decreased from 100,000 to less than 20,000 students in 2022. Parents with wealth and access are choosing to go to other places with better schools, support, and opportunities. But what about the parents who are trapped in chronically failing schools operating under a flawed education system?

This is the unmet need that B2H serves. By equipping, connecting and engaging parents to advocate, demand, and take action on behalf of not just their children but all children, we believe this impact will change the system. Parents have to take their rightful place back in the education space. There is no greater time than now. We believe the people closest to the problem have the brilliance, expertise, and lived experience needed to disrupt the inequitable systems of education, moving out of the "you don't know what you don't know" space and activating their power to create change.

I had a unique educational experience. I too was removed from my neighborhood school through the desegregation program. I did learn in those schools, but I wasn't valued in them. I do this work because I believe all children deserve a chance to write their own path to a great education. No more barriers!

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Eric began his career in education teaching middle school science in the Bronx in New York City as part of Teach For America. He had a number of roles on Teach For America's staff including helping to open the St. Louis region and to lead the San Francisco Bay Area region through a major expansion. In these roles, Eric helped to codify the organization's regional growth and fundraising strategy and then served as Teach For America's Chief of Strategy and External

Affairs nationally. In this role, he oversaw the unprecedented growth of the organization: opening 16 new sites, growing regional fundraising from \$82 million to \$228 million, and securing over \$50 million in federal funding that fueled a 67% increase in the size of the national teacher corps.
